# **NEWSLETTER**

#### EDITORIAL.

This is the first issue of a newsletter to our members. We plan to produce issues in spring and autumn.

It is nearly 10 years since the foundation of the Warwickshire Geological Conservation Group which grew from an initiative of the Wildlife Trust. Our aim is to conserve geological sites in Warwickshire, to foster interest in geology and geological conservation and to support geological education.

The County of Warwickshire boasts a remarkable geological diversity.

In the north are the hard and ancient rocks of the Nuneaton Ridge and the Coal Measures once extensively worked in deep mines and open cast sites.

In central Warwickshire red mudstones colour the soils and red desert sandstones of various ages were used in building old Coventry Cathedral and Kenilworth Castle. These contrast with the younger, lighter coloured sandstone of the castle in Warwick.

To the south are the rusty coloured ironstones of Edgehill (formerly used as an iron ore), and in the far south, there are honey-coloured Cotswolds oolites. Sands and gravels, largely found in the river valleys, are still worked and yield valuable evidence of former ice age and interglacial conditions. This geological heritage provides evidence for a remarkable range of environmental conditions over the last 600 million years. From Precambrian volcanic beginnings, the area has subsequently played host to trilobite-infested seas, coal swamps, arid desert fans and ice sheets. The landscapes of the county reflects the is wide variety of solid rocks sculptured and mantled by glacial deposits.

Much of this rich geological heritage is hidden beneath towns, villages and fields but comes to light in quarries, road and railway cuttings, stream banks, and temporary exposures such as construction sites, and building foundations. This irreplaceable resource is coming under increasing pressure from developers and landfill and the number of sites available for people to visit and learn is diminishing.

One of the key roles of the Warwickshire Geological Conservation Group is to safeguard the county' sites allowing them every chance of long-term survival for use by future generations. The group has designated nearly fifty Regionally Important Geological Sites [RIGS] within the old county boundary (which includes Coventry and Solihull). Volunteers from the WGCG record and monitor sites of geological interest complementing the work of the Museum where Jon Radley, the Keeper of Geology maintains Warwickshire's geological record centre.

The WGCG also has a programme of summer field trips. Winter talks with a wide appeal are held by kind permission in St John's Museum Warwick.
